



## Most cities have experienced a 'jobs miracle'


### Net new job creation in British cities and large towns, 2010 - 2022


# But productivity growth has been poor

Real output per hour growth across cities and large towns, 2010 - 2021



# This has not been good for incomes




## Meaning people are less well off across the country

# Rising housing costs have compounded this




# And relative poverty has increased
